The Meghalaya Livelihood Improvement Project for the Himalayas (MLIPH)

Project Overview

The Meghalaya Rural Development Society (MRDS) is a registered Society currently implementing the Meghalaya Livelihood Improvement Project for the Himalayas . Chief Secretary, Govt of Meghalaya is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of MRDS with the Planning Department as the nodal agency. This Project is funded by the International Fund for Agriculture Development IFAD), the Government of Meghalaya (GoM), the Government of India and Micro-Finance Institutions (MFIs) besides contributions from the communities themselves. The total project cost around Rs 182 crores which is shared thus: IFAD-47.40%, GoM-13.60%, MFIs -27.80% and Communities-11.20%. The Project is designed to spread over 8 years, working in 5 districts of the state (excluding West Garo Hills and West Khasi Hills) and covering approximately 38,623 households. The Project started operating in 2005-2006 and has targeted the formation of 2000 SHGs.

The Goal of the Project is to improve the livelihood of vulnerable groups in a sustainable manner through the promotion of improved opportunities livelihood strengthening of local institutions that relate to livelihood development. The principle of 'self help' lies at the core of livelihood improvement and thus the Self Help Group movement is the platform from where the project has launch its activities. The Project has four components, namely:

1) Empowerment and Capacity-Building for Communities and Support Organizations; 2) Livelihood Enhancement and Development; 3) Livelihood Support Systems; and 4) Project management. The precise nature of these components will be discussed in the future issues of this Newsletter. However, a summary of the work that has been carried out by the Project under these components is given in the Factsheet below.

The other broad dimension of the Project is the establishment of a Social Venture Capital Company (SVCC) which will bring in the technical expertise to manage an enterprise mode of livelihood enhancement and development for SHG members. (Details of the SVCC will be provided in future issues). The SVCC will be headed by a CEO, the task of which has been undertaken by Shri R.G. Lyngdoh. The staff of MRDS and SHGs at large welcome him.

SHG Federation to cultivate Lakadong Turmeric

16 SHGs under MLIPH in Laskein Block, Jaintia Hills has come together under an SHG Federation called L.I.F.E (Laskein Federation of SHGs) for the cultivation and processing of Lakadong Turmeric. Lakadong is considered to be one of the finest varieties of turmeric in the world, with a high curcumin content(6.8%-7.5% as recorded by ICAR). Combined with its robust aroma and colour, it has tremendous market potential in India and possibly abroad. Lakadong is mostly cultivated by small and marginal farmers. If properly constructed, much of the value of this market can be captured by the cultivators, significantly increasing their incomes and strengthening their economic security. The slicing of Turmeric is done by hand and is traditionally the job of women. This is time consuming often leading to

drudgery and in-efficiency. The method of drying too is not hygienic and wholly dependent on the availability of sunlight. Hence, the product presently available in the market is of questionable quality.

MRDS has set up a demonstration unit to mechanise the processes of slicing

and drying, making them more scientific and hygienic. 30 members of the SHG Federation were taken on an exposure trip to a processing plant in Kerela to see first hand how the mechanisation is done and how such a plant is actually run and managed. The exposure visit was supported by NABARD under its 'Capacity Building for Adoption of Technology' programme. The demonstration unit was set up after this trip, and the SHG Federation contributed 10% of the total cost of this unit while the land (market value of approximately Rs 4 lakhs) on which the unit is located was given by the Village Institution (Dorbar) of the area to the Federation free of charge. The unit is being run by trained members of the Federation and trial production is in progress. SHG members have observed an improvement in the quality of Lakadong being produced in the unit and are looking to increase the area of cultiva-

Success Stories: Income Generation through Self Help

In the last few years there has been successful examples of Income Generating Activities (IGAs) that SHGs have taken up raise their standard of living. The activities range from goat rearing to cultivation of Coloured Capsicum and from paddy cultivation to piggery. Here are a few examples:

1. Name of SHG: Synroplang

Type of IGA: Ginger Cultivation-Nongkohlew village in Mylliem Block, East Khasi Hills, has around 80 families who depend mainly on agriculture. FMA-Outreach, a local NGO, after mobilizing a group of 10 men, all from Below Poverty Line families, into an SHG gave them a loan of Rs 2000 to take up ginger cultivation. Along with assistance of Rs 6000 from the Soil Deptt, the group started this activity in all earnest. The members shared responsibilities in the cultivation process and toiled with a single minded purpose. By the end of the year, they were able to sell Rs 11,000 worth of ginger. The group now has a total of Rs 16620 which they are utilizing to upscale their activity.

Name of SHG: Teilang Type of IGA: Goat Rearing

Teilang is a female SHG from the intreriors of Mawkyrwat Block, West Khasi Hills. Their village, Mawkabait is cut off in terms of road connectivity and electricity, yet this group of 12 women have managed to plough on despite these difficulties. They took a loan of Rs 20,000 from the Apex cooperative Bank to rear goats. The determination of the members paid off when they were able to sell these goats for Rs 45,000, enabling them to pay back the loan. The profit they made along with their savings now amount to over Rs 10,000.

3. Name of SHG: Iakyrshanlum

Type of IGA: Paddy Cultivation Iakyrshanlum is a female SHG from Umpling, Shillong. The group received Rs 3000 from the Soil Deptt, East Khasi Hills and contributed Rs 2000 from their own savings to start this activity. Their first ever sale amounted to Rs 8000, getting them a profit of Rs 3000. The group still meets regularly and this activity con-

-tinues to give them a living income

 Name of SHG: Bolkawak K SHG & Immong K SHG

Type of IGA : Coloured Capsi -

An initiative to provide alternative source of livelihood for the SHGs through technology intervention was undertaken by the IFAD-MRDS Project through an introduction of scientific cultivation of color capsicum. This intervention was done in conjunction with the district horticulture mission as part of its objective to develop centrally located horticulture model nursery demonstration farms. Two women SHGs from East Garo Hills were provided exposure in the above method and took up this activity as an income generation activity. An early assessment shows a saving to the tune of Rs 25,000 per SHG.

Mechanisation Programme in Meghalaya

The Govt. of Meghalaya through the Deptt of Agriculture is implementing schemes in the Centrally Sponsored/Central Sector such as 'Promotion of Agriculture Mechanisation' where various tools/machines are offered at a subsidized rate. The following are some of the items available with the District Agriculture Officers now:

Microfinance Innovations in India

The Phenomenal growth rate of microfinance sector, especially the SHG bank linkage programme has posed number of issues and challenges which need immediate attention. In response to this a number of innovations have been initiated with the desire to improve the outreach and sustainability of the programme. Some of the pilot projects designed and initiated recently are summarized here.

Grain Banks and SHGs

It is a common practice among tribal populations of the country to use Grain Banks (Grain Golas) for saving grains during the harvesting seasons and using them to meet their consumption requirements during the lean/dry seasons. In view of this, NABARD has launched a pilot project on Grain Banks in 17 villages of Orissa. Apart from the savings in cash and monetization of the savings-in-kind, loans to SHGs against their stock of grains will also be considered by the

Grain Banks. Members can also save and draw loans in cash and/or kind. So far 3 Grain Banks and 29 SHGs have been formed under the project.

Rural Volunteers as Book Writers

Based on interactions with banks and NGOs, NABARD, has launched a pilot project for associating rural volunteers as book writers for SHGs to improve the regularity/accuracy in the maintenance of books and accounts and to explore a possible evolution of MIS between SHGs and banks. A grant assistance of Rs 7.5 lakh has been sanctioned to cover honorarium to the book writers, cost of their training and stationery required for book keeping of SHGs. The project is being implemented through 5 RRBs in three districts of Uttar Pradesh and two districts of Bihar.

Social Security System for SHG Members

This project provides a package of health insurance, life insurance etc

for SHG households by paying premium generated through discounts offered by service providers like grocery shop, cloth merchant etc in the project area for SHG members in rural areas. It is being implemented in two villages covering 500 poor households from Betul district of Madhya Pradesh involving a grant assistance of Rs.8 lakh. Self Employed Groups (SEGs) from SHGs are being formed to provide various services involving selling of products at a discount.

State Coordinator for SHGs

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
